

Program Overview

Fall Semester: Agent

This 16-week program is designed to move young people toward service and community awareness while also deepening their knowledge of God's word. Students who complete this program find themselves well prepared to effectively communicate their values in future academic and professional settings.

Students earn points toward their goal of *Agent* status through assignments including topical studies in Scripture, interviewing and shadowing local leaders from various occupations, and volunteering for a non-profit organization. After completing the Agent semester, students may choose to continue to the 16-week spring program to achieve *Special Agent* status.

Program Objectives

After successful completion of this program, students will:

- Enhance verbal and written communication skills through reports and interviews.
- Read from a variety of authors to build a framework for how to interact with the world.
- Apply Scripture to different areas of the world to continue to develop a Biblical way of thinking.
- Recognize and analyze the importance of different functions of local government.
- Engage in their local community through volunteering and interviewing local leaders.

Spring Semester: Special Agent

This 16-week program, running from January-April, takes the Ambassador League program to a higher level. Here, students engage in assignments that focus on a political distinction: students volunteer with a political campaign or public policy group, interview local leaders, observe the state legislature, and spend time studying what Scripture says about justice and mercy, the government, and marriage.

This is the second of two courses: to complete the Special Agent Semester, you must complete the Agent semester program.

Program Objectives

After successful completion of this program, students will:

- Enhance verbal and written communication skills through reports, interviews, and public speaking.
- Read and apply Scripture to develop a Biblical way of thinking and approaching the world, specifically focusing on the government and how we are to interact with it.
- Recognize and analyze the importance of different functions of local government through observing the state legislature and a local judicial trial.
- Engage in their local community through volunteering for a political campaign or public policy group and interviewing local leaders.

Honors Distinction

Students in the Agent or Special Agent program may submit an additional report on their LEAD experience to achieve the *Honors Distinction*. This report may be completed retroactively, meaning, if you have not already attended LEAD when you enroll in Ambassador League, you may attend LEAD in the summer of 2027, and then submit this report before August 31st, 2027, to achieve this distinction.

Assignments

Fall Semester: Agent

All assignments, with the exception of the Declaration of Intent and Monthly Check-in Calls, require a 500-1000-word report. It is recommended that Agents submit four assignments per month. All reports must be submitted by December 19th, 2026, to be considered for acceptance.

Spring Semester: Special Agent

All assignments, with the exception of the Monthly Check-in Calls, require a 500-1000-word report. It is recommended that Special Agents submit three assignments per month. All reports must be submitted by April 17th, 2027, to be considered for acceptance.
